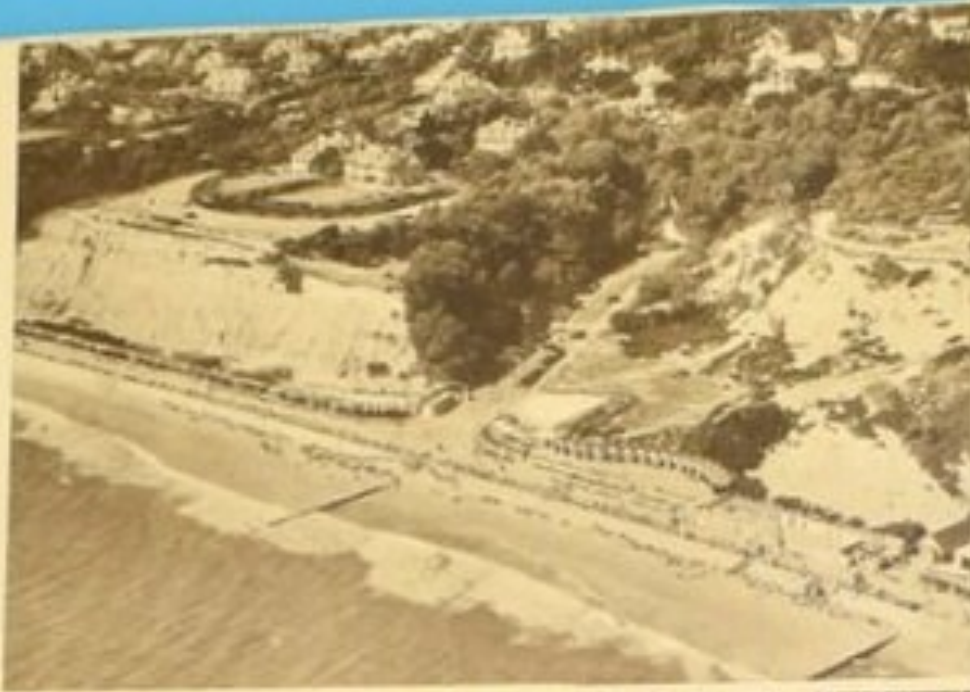
Miss Olive Miles and Master John Dade were attendants.

A reception was held in the **hall** adjoining the chapel, to which 50 guests were invited, after which the bridal couple left for their honeymoon in Bath.

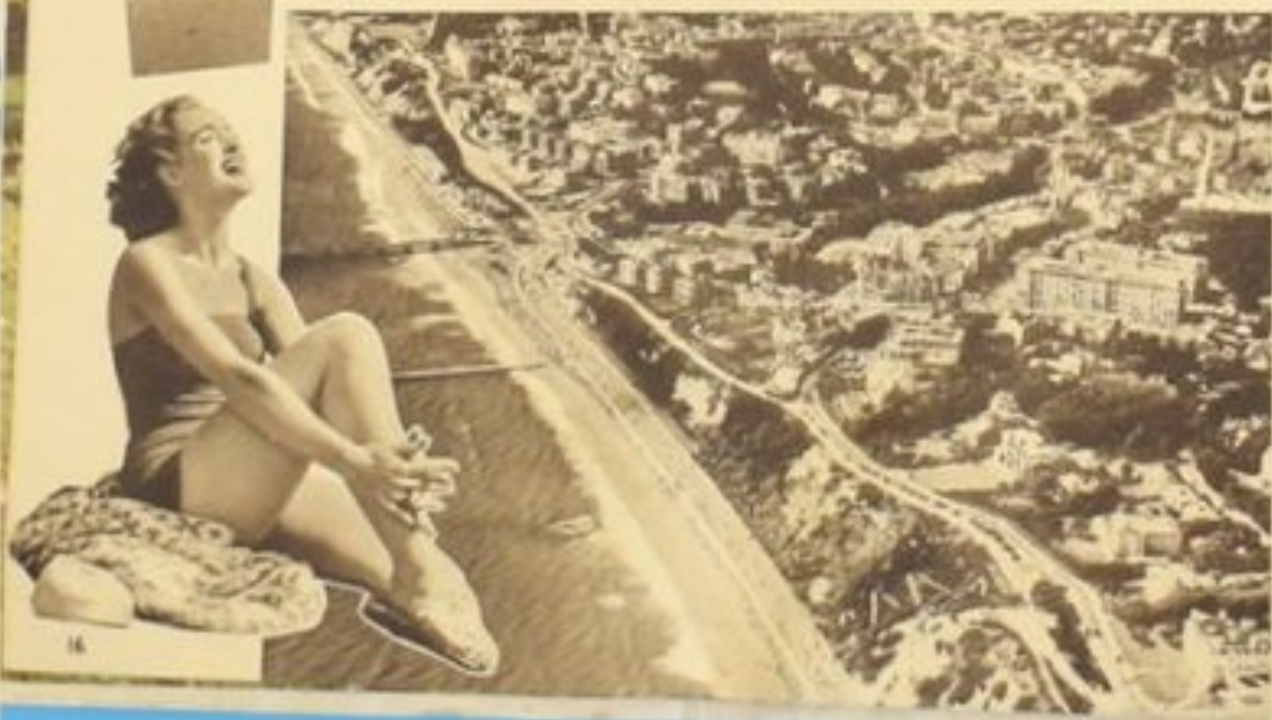
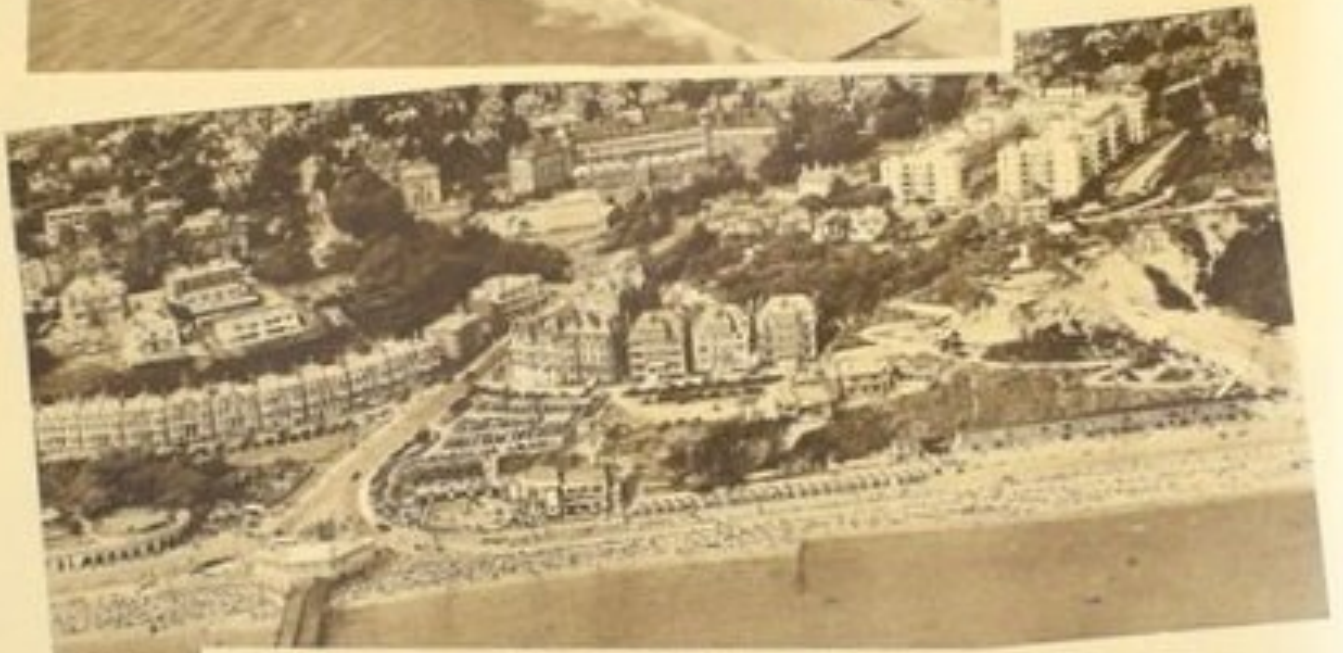
